

The Founding of the HFA in America and the UK

The impending birth of his second daughter, Betsy, in 1976 led Dale Harmer to begin a search for his ancestors who had this very unusual surname, Harmer. This search began in the US with the usual searches of birth, marriage, death and census records and led to further searches in Sussex County, England where his grandfather, Samuel Edward Harmer was born according to his marriage certificate from Wisconsin. Since England was a long way away from Washington State, where Dale resided in 1976 he decided to

hire a professional genealogist, Leslie Suggars, to search the English records. Much was learned from this search, but the best result, by far, was the introduction to Stanley John Harmer who, according to Mr. Suggars, had already done considerable research into the Harmer family!

Dale and John began a long correspondence which led to the founding of the Harmer Family Association, which was incorporated in Washington State in 1977, the first Harmer Family Newsletter was published spring 1978 and the first Harmer Family Reunion was held 9 September 1978 at Haremere Hall, Etchingham, East Sussex, England. Although this first HFA reunion was a big success, unfortunately Stanley John Harmer died within weeks of the event and the fledgling HFA was thrown into disarray for a time before several new UK members stepped in to fill the gap. The HFA Newsletter was published by Dale Harmer for the first three years before being transferred to the UK, where it has remained since. During this first three years, much of the recruiting of new members was done by mail from the USA. Although the HFA is very ably run by a UK Committee now, the American Branch has continued to thrive and we (as of Jan. 2010) have 63 members from 22 states of the union. States with the most HFA members are Oregon with 11 members, Minnesota with 8 members, and California with 7 members.

The earliest known Harmer to arrive in the USA was George Harmer, a Quaker from Wiltshire, England who landed in Pennsylvania prior to 1690 with his wife, Mary. George was one of several brothers who settled and raised families in Philadelphia. Some of the more well-known American Harmers include: General Josiah Harmar, (an alternative spelling of Harmer) from the Revolutionary War, Alexander F. Harmer a painter from Santa Barbara, California and E.G. Harmer of the Harmer-Rooke stamp and coin collectors fame.
